

There were 27 Guild members gathered at Mimi Rodes's beautiful home to celebrate the holiday season. Her house was buzzing with conversation: who bought what loom, what are you weaving now, what loom should I buy; are you taking the workshop; what are you entering into the show? How did you make those wonderful macaroons, Juliette? What is happening at the Craft House? And that was just at my table!

Thanks so much to Mimi, who hosted while busily making preparations for the biennial Guild show, which opens January 10! At the opening, we will have Nadine Sanders, the Singing Weaver, give a presentation on Creative Focus. Warps for the workshop were distributed.

Judie Eatough shared a new book: A Crackle Weave Companion:

Exploring Four-Shaft Crackle, by Lucy M. Brusic, published by Kirk House Publishers. Here is the Amazon website summary:

"A Crackle Weave Companion is a new comprehensive guide to the Crackle weave and its literature. Lucy Brusic brings together in one volume more than 100 four-shaft Crackle patterns previously published in the books of Marguerite Davison, Mary Snyder, and Mary Atwater. Using an easy-to-follow letter transcription system, A Crackle Weave Companion updates the older patterns and shows how they can be adapted to wider or narrower warps. Crackle weave is a system of small twill blocks. Traditional Crackle creates a sturdy fabric with short floats. However, many untraditional design ideas and color mixing experiments are also possible with this weave structure.

"Anyone who can read a four-shaft draft and thread a loom can use this book. This book is designed to help the person who does not know much about Crackle become more proficient in the weave, but it is also designed to be an inspiration to all weavers, Crackle and otherwise, who want to understand how this structure works."

After a great potluck dinner, we were on to the gift exchange there were wool roving and yarns: lace weight merino tencel blend, chenille, and handspun wool and cotton. There were woven items-Guatemalan straps, triangle loom shawl, towels, scarf, knitted items, lace shawl and hat, and scarves, felted mobile, Christmas ornaments, apron with blackwork, books, both handmade and on weaving, bookmarks, hot pads, hug light, soap and honey, baskets, and scarves galore.
