Presentations by Tom Knisely

"American and Historic Textiles" (Friday evening)

Tom will share examples from his collection of coverlets, linens, pieces of coverlets, jacquard and overshot weaving, and embroidery. He will talk about the history behind the pieces, which he has researched or documented in person, and how and where he collected the pieces.

"Antique Japanese Rural Textiles" (Saturday morning)

Tom will show and discuss antique Japanese rural textiles made from recycled scraps of materials and threads. He will show examples of antique Japanese fabrics woven with techniques such as Sakiori weaving—salvaged rags and bits of fabric; Zanshi weaving—small bits of threads tied together and woven together; Sashiko—the art of re-piecing and stitching worn out kimonos, etc. Tom will also share his experiments in applying these techniques "with a modern touch."





Tom Knisely

Tom Knisely has made his career from his interest and love of textiles from around the world. Tom has been studying, collecting, and teaching others about weaving and spinning for more than four decades, making him one of the most well-versed weaving instructors in North America. In addition to teaching, Tom weaves professionally and is a frequent contributor to *Handwoven* magazine. Tom is renowned among his students for his kindness, good humor, and "seemingly infinite knowledge on the subject of weaving." Tom's broad knowledge of textiles and textile equipment has brought him international recognition, and he is frequently asked to teach and lecture to groups all over. Tom is the author of several books—*Handwoven Table Linens, Weaving Rag Rugs, Handwoven Baby Blankets*—and a number of DVDs and individual projects available through Interweave (Beginning Weaving, Weave a Good Rug, The Loom Owner's Companion, etc.).

Afternoon Workshops

"Fun Felted Scarves," with Beth Myrer

Learn how to make fun wool scarves using the wet felting method. Learn how add adornments and get great effects with color and texture. Beth Myrer began exploring textiles as a child while sewing shorts for summer, and she progressed from there. She taught herself to knit and crochet and progressed onto embroidery and lace making. In the 1990s she was able to take a weaving class, and she learned to love the art of creating cloth. Weaving exposed Beth to spinning and felt making. Beth has taught at EGA Rocky Mountain Regional Seminar, as well as in the local Embroiderer's Guild and Weaver's Guild. (Maximum participants: 8)



"Silk Painting," with Debbi Sigg

Learn how to paint with Setasilk silk paint on pre-stretched silk hoops. Debbi will provide the brushes, paints, resist, silk hoops, and a variety of sketches, or participants can bring their own designs. Participants will sketch a design onto the silk hoop, apply a water-soluble resist, and paint their design. Or they can use one of Debbi's designs. Debbi Sigg has been silk painting for nine years. This photo shows one of her recent scarves. She has studied under Elise Wilding, Susan Moyer, Karen Sistek, Kiranada Sterling Benjamin, and Sissi Siska. Her love of art and her love of sharing her knowledge are evident in her classes. (Maximum participants: 20)



"Colorful Coiled Bowls," with Juliette Lanvers

Make wonderful round or oblong bowls using hand-dyed rope and a sewing machine. Participants will learn how to shape their bowl—flaring and curving sides to create a pleasing shape. Different finishes and inclusions will be discussed. Participants will need to bring a sewing machine with zigzag capability to the workshop. Juliette Lanvers is a former Bernina USA Ambassador. She has taught private sewing lessons as well as group lessons at Elaine's Quilt Block and the Pioneer Craft House. (Maximum participants: 8)

April Meeting: Lace Challenge and Maximo Laura, Tapestry Weaver

After the excitement of last month's meeting at the Utah Museum of Natural History, we settled back into our more regular routine, meeting back at the church, where I noticed the banner over the entrance, shown here: Weaving the Web of Community!

We began with the Show and Tell, with several members work and new acquisitions: Beth's chenille baby blanket, so soft; Susan's beautiful cottolin towels; Judie's new books: Weaving on Three Shafts, Erica de Reuter, and the Ondule' Textiles Book, both soon to be in the Guild



Library; Jeanette's lovely, fine silk and cashmere scarves, one wet finished, the other not; Catherine's natural cotton towels for the Guild Sale (start weaving everyone it will be here before you know it); Mimi's cotton chenille rug, very inspiring and an arashi shibori scarf; and Sonya's collection of Library Totes (which were a hit!), her lauhala bag from Hawaii, a wool blanket, rosepath baby wrap sample, and an Andean poncho woven in two panels.

After the business meeting, Michelle P. introduced the lace challenge that included drafts for Guild members. Leslie showed us her beautiful woven scarf done in a random Brooks Bouquet pattern in fine merino to imitate rain on a window. Jo S. wove a runner in turned overshot and lace, called Quilt Squares, done in 10/2 and 5/2 cotton. Susan H. showed her 8-shaft huck sampler to be used as a basis for new curtains for her front door window. Judie E. brought a towel in huck lace, based on one she bought, woven in a 6-shaft pattern. Ping wove placemats in a 4-shaft Bronson lace in 5/2 cotton. Michelle wove a towel in huck lace in 8/2 cotton as well as a silk scarf in a huck lace-plainweave combination, which gave an interesting seersucker effect when wet-finished. Eileen B. wove a 4-shaft huck lace sampler in gold 10/2 cotton with 3 different treadlings. Catherine M. wove a piece in Danish medallion, which she described as very labor intensive; she also wove a zigzag lace scarf in bamboo. Sandra S. wove a Swedish lace piece. Mimi R. wove a Spanish lace patterned red mohair scarf as well as two shibori pieces, using lace structure to weave the pull threads for the dyeing. All of the lace challenge pieces were very inspiring.

After the lace challenge reveal, Mimi Rodes gave a presentation of her tour of Maximo Laura's Tapestry Weaving studio. Máximo Laura is an award-winning Peruvian tapestry weaver, internationally recognized as one of South America's pre-eminent and most unique textile artists. Mimi and Sandra Sandberg had the incredible opportunity to see his studio and many of his designs. His designs are beautiful, with an amazing use of color. Then Karen Elrod talked about her experience taking a weaving workshop in Maximo Laura's studio and showed us the piece she brought home.
