Where: South Valley Unitarian Church, 6876 Highland Drive, basement


Be sure to attend on our annual Guild Christmas party. On Thursday, December 8, we will

Shuttle-Craft Bulletins: Crackle Weave


The Shuttle-Craft Bulletins covered in this article are from August 1936 and July 1938. These Bulletins are on the Guild website under the Bulletins Tab.

Mary Meigs Atwater first introduced the Crackle Weave to the Shuttle-Craft Guild in the October 1927 Bulletin, in a Scandinavian linen weave. She named it Crackle in the November 1928 issue, as noted by Susan Wilson in her book *Weave Classic Crackle & More*, published by Schiffer Press in 2011. It is a block weave, so it is suitable for this year's challenge.

In the August 1936 Bulletin, Mary referred to an out-of-print pamphlet she had produced on the Crackle Weave and wrote that she would provide the same information there.

The Crackle Weave produces a firm fabric and short floats that may be repeated to large blocks, so it was an appropriate weave for more modern designs, with larger motifs. Crackle is generally, but not always, woven with pattern shots alternating with tabby A and B.

Four drafts were included in the 1936 issue. Draft A is shown here. Mary wrote that this draft would be suitable for linens and curtains as it has the same figures on the front and back of the fabric. It also



lends itself to be woven in what Mary called the "Italian Manner," with a 2/2 twill tie-up, adjusted for a rising shed, shown in the tables here:



Background sheds alternate with the pattern shed, instead of tabby A and B. This treadling produces a thick, soft fabric, suitable for blankets or maybe bath towels. The two background shots may be in different colors. Mary wrote that a tabby could be added after each pair of pattern and background shots for a firmer fabric. The drawdown is on the next page, with two background colors, but no tabby. There is not a big difference from the version above but there should be in the finished cloth.

Draft b is presented in two versions, one conventional and the other considered to be of more modern design, again with the same figure on both sides. It was described as a good threading for linens, bags, and small articles.

Draft c was designed for a rug, or a portion of it might be used for linens with an interesting diagonal pattern. Finally, draft d is a classic colonial pattern: double snowball, good for coverlets, runners, or pillow tops.

In the July 1938 issue, Mary provided new crackle weave designs:



- > Cat's Cradle, an allover pattern with two treadling methods, good for upholstery
- > Dark Reflections, designed for drapery, but also useful for table runners or rugs
- > Clematis Vine, a more colonial design good for coverlets or tablecloths.

Mary also provided three summer and winter profile drafts that may be woven as crackle. She repeated the Italian manner treadling instructions and wrote that the method is good for bags, pillow tops and wall hangings. Toweling may be woven with a soft strand cotton. She included a notice at the end for a low-cost weaving material called loopers or yarn links, waste from the stocking mills. It appears that sock loopers have been with us for a long time! *Maureen Wilson*
